WHICH TOPICS ARE COVERED?

The A-level Spanish course builds on topics at GCSE and introduces new, more complex ones. Many of the topics are topical and link to what you may be studying in other subjects, such as Politics and History.

Year 12 topics:

- Modern and traditional values (Los valores tradicionales y modernos)
- Cyberspace (El ciberespacio)
- Equal rights (La igualdad de los sexos)
- Modern day idols (La influencia de los ídolos)
- Spanish regional identity (La identidad regional en España)
- Cultural heritage (El patrimonio cultural)

Year 13 topics:

- Immigration (La inmigración)
- Racism (El racismo)
- Integration (La convivencia)
- Today's youth, tomorrow's citizens (Jóvenes de hoy, ciudadanos del mañana)
- Monarchies and dictatorships (Monarquías y dictaduras)
- Popular movements (Movimientos populares)

We also study a film (Volver by Pedro Almodóvar) and a play (La casa de Bernada Alba by Lorca) in Y13.



WHAT BACKGROUND KNOWLEDGE WOULD BE USEFUL?

You do not have to be an expert in all of these topics. We recommend researching as many as you can, in English or Spanish:

- Where Spanish speaking countries are located in the world
- The culture of different Spanish speaking countries e.g. music, film, food, literature, landmarks
- The political situation in different Spanish speaking countries e.g. are they monarchies, dictatorships, democracies? What are the biggest issues in these countries? What is life like for young people?
- The Spanish civil war causes and consequences
- Franco's dictatorship what was life like in Spain during this time?
- The Spanish colonisation of the Americas

Once you actually start your A-Level in September, you will realise that you are almost completing a Sociology A-Level in Spanish. It is fascinating and you will learn all about the history and culture of Spanish speakers across the world, not just in Spain.

If you are searching for information, try switching to the Spanish <u>www.es.wikipedia</u>. Remember that anyone can write on Wikipedia so you must validate your research elsewhere and never quote from it! It is however, a good place to start.

You should revise what you have already covered at GCSE so that you are secure on it:

You can complete Duolingo stories on the internet or on a mobile app.


When you first register (select the free account), you will take a quick test which will help the app to tailor the work set to your level.

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TASK 2 CULTURAL AWARENESS
