The fair took place at Sacred Heart in the evening on Tuesday 1 October 2019 and was attended by over 80 visitors.


They publicised the event, organised logistics and prepared information packs.


Why study Physics at Sacrec Heart? No gender bias When it comes to good teaching, one must look at the children you are going to teach and know what will appeal. This means knowing your students and understanding why they are studying physics' we know your girls.

Girls are almost two and a half times more likely to go on to do A-level physics if they came from a girls' school rather than a co-ed school (IOP, 2016): We have no gender bias in our teaching.

Teaching girls is different:

At Sacred Heart there is no attitude that "physics is for boys". Teaching styles are different for boys and girls, we teach in a way that suits girls and allows them to see themselves as successful.

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
After Sacred Heart Sixth Form







In the winter of 2016 the first competitive Sacred Heart rowing was formed. Since then, we have raced in national events every year. Some of these races include Schools head, a 6.7km time trial along the river from Chiswick to Putney; the Junior regatta where we were able to achieve the school its first ever A final. Most noticeably, in June 2019, we raced at Henley Woman's Regatta, an all female regatta set up for the absence of female racing at Henley Royal Regatta. We were still the first state school to have raced at this international event, in spite of competing against private schools and clubs that have a much longer history of competitive rowing.

It is thanks to the hard work of the staff who have established Sacred

Heart High's first rowing club and the work the school has done to get us the opportunities we have been given which has allowed us achieve these results. We are delighted to be given the opportunity to still be on the schools rowing team at Y12 and are now turning our focus to not only the upcoming season but in October next year we hope to compete in the biggest multiday race, The Head of the Charles River in Boston Massachusetts.

Despite the early morning sessions, near impossible ergs and a well thought training program, rowing continues to be a very enjoyable sport that i wish to continue here and into the future.


