

- A reflection on the week "How have I grown?"






Racial Justice Sunday - 13 February 2022




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Art Club: Project 1 CUBIST CLAY MASKS





Holocaust Memorial Day 27 January 2022



Pupils in Y9 are currently studying the Holocaust in RE and History. In History they are looking at the historical background and events, and in RE they are looking at moral issues such as resistance and bystanders.

A group of students from 9C put together an excellent assembly for the whole school. They explored this year's Holocaust Memorial Day theme of 'One Day'. This showed us one day in the Holocaust and linked it to other examples of genocides which followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia, and Darfur.

The RE & History departments arranged for Y9 to have the fantastic opportunity of listening to a live broadcast by Eva Clarke BEM, a Holocaust survivor who was born in Mauthausen camp in 1945. It gave them a first-hand insight into life as a survivor and how it is essential for us to remember all those who were murdered during the Holocaust.

In able to go against the Nazis order,


It was endless,

DIANA AWARD Anti-Bullying Training

On 13 January, the SH Anti-Bullying Ambassador Team really began to come to life after we completed a 3-hour course of anti-bullying training. The point of this training was to teach us, the aspiring Anti-Bullying Ambassadors, how to deal with bullying effectively to support the pupils (both the person exhibiting bullying behaviour and of course the person who is being affected by it) in our school. This was a great experience and we hope to bring a more positive atmosphere to the school through this amazing opportunity.

Through the training we learnt how to effectively plan activities and campaigns that the school can participate in, therefore encouraging us all, as pupils, to learn about anti bullying as a vital concept and analyse our own behaviours. Furthermore, we particularly found it interesting to learn how to actively support students throughout the school one-to-one and in groups; and how to offer them support outside school, particularly online and through social media.

On 1 February, the sixth form anti-bullying team had the opportunity to present a campaign proposal to our Senior Leadership Team, here at Sacred Heart. We were able to put forward the yearly schedule that we have created to tackle bullying behaviour and create an atmosphere of acceptance, awareness and celebration of our differences.

Certain points that we covered in this presentation included our plans to:

- Hold a balloon launch in the netball court (for each year group) to introduce the new movement as well as our team, so pupils know exactly who to go to if affected by bullying behaviour. During this event, we hope to get all the students to write a positive note on each balloon to release, sending positive messages throughout Hammersmith and hopefully further!
- Have monthly themes we want to discuss throughout the year starting from March and spanning the entire school year.
- Set up an anti-bullying section on the school website to provide information on what to do if you are a victim of bullying behaviour or may even be exhibiting bullying behaviour yourself, and wish to reform.

Overall, we all really appreciate the Diana Award charity for providing us with this amazing opportunity to become Anti-Bullying Ambassadors and hopefully begin to make many positive changes in our school community!

Sacred Heart pupils have their say on COP26

On Friday 5 November the Geography department held a COP26 event for pupils from Year 7 to 13. We were each assigned a group which represented different stakeholders, such as the 'Climate Vulnerability Forum (CVF)' an international partnership of countries highly vulnerable to a warming planet, e.g., Bangladesh, Nepal and Kiribati.

A-Level students were tasked with leading younger pupils in discussions and challenging their ideas when it came to the ways we, as young people, could make a positive change for the environment. Anushka, a Year 7 pupil, said "[the event] was very informative. We got the opportunity to present our ideas in a large group. We also had waffles, which were delicious!"

Although we ran into a few technical difficulties, the entire live webinar was an interactive and informative way for us to learn about some of the root causes of global warming which may go unrecognised, such as ploughing agricultural land and the importance of good soil health for tackling the climate emergency (this is explored in more detail below).

Young people from across 43 countries, including the Philippines, Germany and the USA, took part in the event, highlighting how change universal change is needed and we must have a united front. Personally, it was great to see how pupils from across all year groups interacted when groups were tasked with discussing a unique question using our knowledge gained from the webinar.

My group focused on the question 'If you had 100 acres of land, what would you do to help our planet?' Some very interesting ideas came up, such as lab grown meat, that could help to reduce the physical number of cows on the planet thus reducing emissions of harmful greenhouse gases, such as methane. Julia in Year 11 labelled this solution as "Jepic"! Another solution we discussed was afforestation – we learnt that planting as many trees as possible would be great for sequestering carbon from the atmosphere. Each group then took turns to present our ideas to the wider group.

Overall, it was a great experience to collaborate with other Sacred Heart pupils and hear ideas from pupils around the world. Thank you to AimHi Earth and their expert speakers — each of us was able to take away something new that we can hopefully put into action in the future!

The Facts and Figures

What are the politics of the environment like in the UK? In the UK nature receives just 10% of government focus and 3% of the funding. These numbers are not increasing despite the fact that environmental challenges are!

What is the impact of ploughing? Ploughing is used in agriculture, to support crop growth. However, the process kills underground fungal strands leading to a decrease in the capacity of soils to sequester and store carbon.

Where is deforestation occurring? 91% of the deforestation that occurs in the Amazon is a result of agriculture and it the rate is not slowing down, due to continued economic growth.

Which animals are beginning to go extinct? Currently 40% of mammals and 14% of birds are on the verge of extinction. Due to global warming increasing it is expected that 12.5% of all animals will go extinct as we reach various climate 'tipping points'.

How is soil critical for fighting climate change? Healthy soil is needed for plant growth, along-side water, light, carbon dioxide, and nutrients. Soil itself is alive with just 1 tsp containing more living things than the human race. Chemicals aid crop yields in the short term, but in the long term, soil health deteriorates, releasing greenhouse gases into the atmosphere. It is believed that future generations identify lack of attention on soil health as a critical downfall of climate action.

What does COP26 mean?

The recent global climate summit in Glasgow is known as COP26, with COP standing for Conference of the Parties. In diplomatic parlance, "the parties" refers to the 197 nations that agreed to a new environmental pact, the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, at a meeting in 1992.

The Year 7 and 8 teams also played in an EMMAUS schools netball tournament, both teams came second, narrowly losing to St Benedicts.






















Sports Leaders


A Final Word


