
Out of my window, I can see...



The Wellbeing Group shared experiences and felt that the school needed to take time to recover together and reconnect.

The Year 12 Wellbeing Ambassadors went about creating 'Wellbeing Week' ahead of school exams. Each day there was a resource made for form tutors to go through along one of the '5 Magic Ways of Wellbeing'. These are 5 clinically proven ways that people can tackle mental illness by being: Mindful, Active, Generous, Interested & Connected.

For the final day of the week we held a whole school picnic in place of Period 5 to help us connect as a school. It was wonderful to see students sharing food in the sunshine, playing card games and taking time to connect with others by writing affirmations and 'one kind word' on T-Shirts and notepads. The Wellbeing Ambassador Maquila, used the Jack Petchy money she won to buy everyone an ice-lolly which topped it off!

We are also delighted to say that due to the Friday being a nonschool uniform day, we managed to raise over £1,590 for MIND mental health charity. Thank you for all of your support!

A-Level English Trip to Stratford-Upon-Avon

Last week, our A-Level English Literature class had the pleasure of attending a 2 day, Shakespeare-themed experience at the legendary playwright's birthplace, Stratford-Upon-Avon. In order to ensure thorough enrichment and a detailed insight into Shakespeare's life; his intense play Richard III; and the socio-historical context of his period of writing; we were able to all participate in an immersive drama workshop with the Royal Shakespeare Company.

This memorable experience allowed us to begin forming ideas about the themes of power, greed and succession present in Richard III, which we are due to study in Year 13, through acting out in small groups different scenes of the play using varying dramatic styles and emotional intensity. This was followed by a backstage tour of the Royal Shakespeare Theatre, during which our friendly tour guides gave us a historical insight to the architecture around us and the intricacies of the RSC's costume-making processes - we found it especially intriguing that they make all pieces worn by their actors, including armour and accessories!

We finished the day with a relaxing exploration of the surrounding area in Stratford-Upon-Avon admiring the quaint shops and rivers; and a meal at Pizza Express, all finished perfectly with the outstanding production of Richard III. We were privileged to view it from a very interesting angle of the audience, which enabled us to notice subtle staging choices such as the white balloons slowly descending from the ceiling during the opening celebration scene and the use of red during moments of battle and bloodshed.

On our final day of this trip, we were able to visit two of Shakespeare's homes, one of which was his birthplace, as well as a local church which contained his grave. Overall, we found this to be a highly enriching experience as English Literature students, as all of the historical facts we learnt and intricate things we noticed during the production can all be used to write about in the Shakespeare section of our A-Level exam next year.


During the first week of the Easter Holidays fifty Year 10 pupils and five staff headed to the Austrian Alps for a week's skiing.

The Janet Erskine Stuart Group

This term the Janet Erskine Stuart Group have continued to meet weekly to discuss current events and hear from a range of speakers. Tyfenn led us off with a presentation on cancel culture and how it affects all of us at both a macro and micro level.

We had a guest speaker from the BBC, Bridget Harney, who is a commissioner for current affairs programmes at Radio Four and The World Service. She discussed her long career at the BBC, how to get your voice heard as a woman, the importance of finding a mentor and support in any organisation, and learning how to speak with confidence to a big audience. Bridget also answered many questions, not just on careers in broadcasting, but how to navigate the work place generally.

Amongst other topics we covered this term, it was impossible not to reflect on the situation following the Russian invasion of Ukraine. We looked at the history and current role of NATO in the conflict, and considered how its expanding role Eastwards over the last two decades has had an impact on Russian isolationism and Putin's geo-political ambitions. The discussion was fascinating; with so many informed contributions from the combined group experience of having many contacts and relations in Eastern Europe, particularly the Baltic states.

In preparation for the group filling out their UCAS applications, a current undergraduate at Leeds University, (and former SHHS pupil), along with a recent graduate in Chemistry from Manchester talked to us about personal statements, choosing a university, leaving school and moving to a new city and what to expect at university.

Finally, most recently, Ms Key from the English department, gave a presentation to us about her former career as a casting agent in the UK film industry in the UK, and her work on the Harry Potter series of films in particular. She had lots of fascinating information about working in such a stressful, high-pressure industry, and the need to collaborate, have good communication, leadership and negotiation skills in order to succeed.

We had a great term, and look forward to continuing with a range of speakers including a solicitor, barrister and GP planned for the Autumn.

Our collaborations with West London schools led to useful and productive information days for Higher Education this term; both with a University day at St Paul's Girls' School, and another for on Oxbridge in particular. Year 12s applying for medicine and dentistry also went to a day focused on Medical applications at St Augustine's school in Ealing. During lunch, we were shown round the amazing school farm; with sheep, lambs, hens, goats, guinea pigs and other animals that the pupils all take care of themselves.

We have nearly twenty Year 12s embarking on an EPQ this term – the Extended Project Qualification – which is a focused piece of independent research and essay writing, performance or artefact on any subject they are fascinated by and would like to pursue in greater depth. It's the equivalent of half an A Level; Universities hold the EPQ in high regard, and often make a lower offer if an applicant is undertaking one. This year we have a varied and wonderful selection of research topics including: Shark attacks and surfers; the influence of French new wave cinema; disability rights and access in the UK; why do we like sad songs?; the biological evidence of reversing ageing; the reintroduction of the Lynx into the UK; the influence of Argentine tango and many other esoteric and impressively eclectic subjects.













As this school year ends, it is wonderful to be able to share the scale of our fundraising efforts, particularly in these challenging financial times.

We have raised almost **£10,000** in total for charities such as CAFOD, Mac-Millan Cancer Care, Catholic Children's Society and during Lent, *Proyecto Bantaba*, an RSCJ project working with a migrant community in Spain. In addition, we have donated **720** Christmas gifts to young people in need across the South-East as well as **over 630kg of donations for Ealing Food-Bank**.

Whilst the financial donations have been vitally important, it's been a privilege to work alongside our young people who have developed their understanding of Social Awareness and Service, through the organisation of events and preparation of the gifts and food donations. Our Sacred Heart Goals call us to see and respond to the needs of the world, using the gifts and talents we have been given by God.

It has been heart-warming to relaunch the **Junior Goals Graduates** programme this year, which recognises the achievements of students in developing their awareness, understanding and impact of the Sacred Heart Goals in their lives, both in and out of school. Well done to all students involved and a special thank you to Melissa S 10A and Laura B 10S who performed songs by Adele during the judges' deliberation.





Inspirational talk for Year 10 from Army Officer Preet



At age 19, Preet joined the Army Reserves where she was eventually commissioned in 2012. She went to university to study Physiotherapy and graduated in 2012, I was the first person in my family to get a degree and it is remains one of my greatest achievements.

Her appetite for greater and greater challenges started to grow, starting with a half marathon at 20 years old. After completing her first marathon, she decided to try an ultramarathon. Dusk till Dawn (50 miles in the Peak District) which left her feeling very achy and sick but she caught the adventurous bug. The scale of her adventures started to grow and her definition of what is normal changed.

Aged 27, she decided to join the Regular Army and she has not looked back since. She completed large scale exercises/ deployments in Nepal, Kenya and most recently a 6 month UN peacekeeping tour to South Sudan. Whilst in South Sudan (in addition to my duties as task-force Physiotherapist), she organised a 30 hour endurance event to raise money for charity.

She miraculously completed a solo, unsupported crossing of Antarctica, travelling over 1000 miles, pulling a pulk (sledge) with all of her kit, battling temperatures of -50c and wind speeds of up to 60mph. I expect the journey to take approximately 75 days. This journey would make me the first female to cross Antarctica, solo and unsupported.

"Anything ambitious can feel out of reach at the beginning but every bit of training I complete brings me closer to my goal. Hopefully doing something that pushed me so far out of my comfort zone would inspire others to believe in themselves and push their boundaries. After 40 days alone on the ice, I completed my 700 mile journey to the South Pole on 3 Jan 22. You are capable of anything you want. No-matter where you are from or where your start line is, everybody starts somewhere. I dont want to just break the glass ceiling, I want to smash it into a million pieces." she said in her talk. A huge thank you to Ms Nye for organising this inspirational talk!


PSHE First Aid Training for Year 12

During PSHE Day, the Sixth Form participated in a First Aid Training Course. The day was very exciting and insightful, consisting of practical work and demonstrations. We learned how to treat minor injuries such as cuts and nosebleeds. We were able to then use dummies to practice CPR on adults, children, and babies. Along with practical work we were able to see a first aid xox along with the contents for example it included anti-bacterial wipes, plasters and scissors. They told us what equipment would need to be used depending on the type of injury such as plasters for cuts.

A main lesson that we took away from the training course is that in times of First Aid you need to be able to communicate with others around you because during times of accidents there will be many jobs that need to be fulfilled. My favourite part of the day was performing CPR on the baby because we were given real life scenarios which prepared us for those specific situations that could arise. We were also introduced us to an App called ' Siren Training' which re-inforced our knowledge and reassured us that if we ever needed to perform First Aid the information would be on the App and easily accessible..

Modern Languages Inspire Programme at St John's College, Oxford



On a bright, sunny crisp morning I made my way into Oxford to take part in the St. John's, Modern Languages Inspire Programme. Feeling a little nervous and quite small against the overbearing doors of the College, I made my way inside and was directed towards the Garden Reception Room.

After some difficulties navigating through the numerous 'quads', the Garden Room was found. Strikingly, the diverse range of architecture stunned me. A quasi-brutalist approach to accommodation for first years, whilst the Larkin Room and Hall showcased its neo-Georgian splendour. Soon after ice-breaker events were completed, we attended an itinerary talk in the Garden Auditorium Room and the excitement was truly apparent.


Not long after 11 o'clock, we began our first session, Spanish Literature (and film). We approached directorial techniques in Argentinian film including frame, angles, composition and point of view. For a thesp, like myself, this was truly a dream come true. The lecture continued as we covered editing techniques and how they affect the overall scenes within a film. Soon after, we watched the first 7 minutes of La Mujer sin Cabeza (The Headless Woman, dir. Lucrecia Martel) depicting a tense mise-en-scène as the rest of the story unfolded.

German tasters included guttural introductions that made the Larkin Room sound as if it has been inundated with a harem of seals. Meanwhile, lunch was being prepared in 'Hall'.

Soon after lunch, we took part in a lecture regarding Spanish poetry. A close reading of Roque Dalton's, 'Como Tú' led to discursive engagement as to what connotations 'el pan' (the bread) has within the context of the poem. We covered the underlying Catholic implications of the poem and how 'la poesía' (poetry) reigns as an overarching theme as a respite from the trappings of Paraguayan dictatorship. As regards poetry, that was the favourite 'paper' (module) of our student leader in first year at St. John's. She took us on a whistle-stop tour of the college; the quads, Chapel, gym, the JCR, accommodation and even shared what, 'Missie', the college hawk was like.

After all of the seventeen-year-olds returned to the auditorium, feeling heavy with the barrage of information regarding UCAS, the 15th October, MLAT papers and interview experiences; it was time to retire back to where we started, some six hours before.

I cannot thank the team at St John's College enough for their hospitality, organisation and their general attitude towards us all.
